

- Local community groups working in partnerships, experience the overlap between governance, society, business and nature.



Tidy Towns focus on SDG's

Goals & Actions



Global Significance:

- Economic Refugee crisis
- Unequal access to basic services, economic resources, exposure to shocks and disasters.

Local Action:

- Create access to safe public spaces and services in your community
- Seek out and support the elderly & poor.
- Include the people on the margins.



Youghal Community Garden

Global Significance:

- Poverty and hunger are linked
- Hunger is the most urgent human rights violation.
- 690 million people affected especially rural populations, women and children ((un.org)
- Malnutrition limits physical and mental development
- Food security is threatened by climate change, degraded land, biodiversity loss and water scarcity.

- Support local food producers
- Grow your own
- Care for your soil, air and water




Combat human suffering:

- undiagnosed and diagnosed diseases,
- Maternal and child mortality,
- malnutrition,
- Substance abuse.
- Road injuries,
- Environmental pollution

Local Action:

- Support community centres as health hubs
- Care for natural public spaces such as woodlands or coastal walks.
- Take part and maintain in sport facilities



Global Significance:

Education is essential for:

 personal development, social inclusion, cultural diversity, and democratic citizenship

Challenges:

 lack of access, low quality, high dropout rates, gender disparities, and insufficient skills for the future.

- Support teachers to raise awareness of local environment and social needs.
- Adult education opportunities
- Practical skills training



'By denying women equal rights, **we deny half the population a chance to live life** at its fullest and to contribute to the development of society'.

Discrimination and violence against women and girls affects their:

 education, health, work, political participation, and cultural growth.

Local Action:

- Support female- owned businesses
- Create safe and secure public spaces
- Invite all members of communities to take part in project planning and executing.



Global Significance:

- Deaths from waterborne diseases
- Hygiene and nutrition in Food systems
- Impact biodiversity in ecosystems

- Avoid using fertilizers, cleaning agents, insecticides and herbicides that filters into our streams.
- Install rainwater harvesting tanks for local use.
- Create greywater filtration systems to clean water on site.
- Slow down storm water runoff with Sustainable urban drainage systems (SUDS)

7 AFFORDABLE AND CLEAN ENERGY




B&N Youghal Zero Waste Fest

Global Significance:

- Majority of current heat and electricity sources are fossil-based.
- This emits greenhouse gases adding to global warming and air pollution.
- Air pollution from fossil fuels affect human and ecosystem health

Local Action:

- Install energy saving measures to community buildings, such as insulation, timers and visible energy meters
- Install solar panels, biogas or wind turbines to produce energy locally and for the grid.
- Participate in public campagnes for policies to roll-out clean energy.



Global Significance:

- Decent work helps reduce poverty, hunger, inequality and environmental degradation.
- Sustainable economic growth for local entrepreneurs and innovation.
- Circular economy can create meaningful local employment.

- Source products and services from local suppliers
- Take part in a community garden to produce and recycle nutrients and organic materials.
- Establish a fix shed to divert fixable items from landfill, and employ local fixing skills.





- Ensure dignity of ALL people
- Means toward other SDG's
- Inequality:
 - o undermines social cohesion,
 - erodes trust in institutions,
 - o fuel violence and conflict.
 - economic growth and environmental protection.
- Equality can:
 - o enhance social mobility,
 - o foster inclusion and participation


- Participate in planning for refugee and immigration into towns.
- Support local business and work opportunities.



- Cities are home to more than half of the global population.
- In ireland: for every 100 people living rural, 175 people live in the city (Central statistics office: 2021)
- Cities are the economic, social and cultural hubs
- Cities rely heavily on energy and natural infrastructure for food and transport.

Local Action:

- Support local producers.
- Promote non-motorised transport systems, like bike lanes, busses and ride share platforms.
- Create a community hub to share surplus good and services.




Global Significance:

- We consume far beyond what our planet can provide
- We generate too much waste and pollution.
- If we continue, we will need three planets to support this way of life by 2050.

Local Action:

- Choose re-usable and biodegradable products.
- Encourage businesses to cut supply of single-use packaging.
- Support local producers and service providers, to limit transport and pollution.
- Source and distribute surplus goods into the community:

eg: setting up a nursery for unsold plants from chain supermarkets



Inishowen River Trust-bank stabilisation

- Climate change affects global and local communities
- Environmental refugees
- Resource conflicts

Local Action:

- Map out recent impacts from weather events: flooding, fire, alien invasive species.
- River and soil stabilisation projects using natural solutions.
- Reduce the use of fossil fuels:
 - Work locally or remotely
 - Use shared or non-motorised transport for goods and people
 - Use appropriate heating and lightning in public spaces.



Seaweed ID & beach clean-up

Global Significance:

- Oceans cover more than 70% of the earth
- Vital ecosystems that provide temperature regulation, food security, tourism, recreation and biodiversity
- Source of innovation for potential solutions to renewable energy, biotech and medicine.


- Raise awareness in our coastal communities by organising beach clean-ups to see what pollutants are recurring
- Encourage local supermarkets and hospitality to use sustainably sourced sea products.



- Our Land ecosystems are the foundation for life on this planet
- Forests and other ecosystems regulates and provide resources for living.
- Habitat loss and degradation weakening the entire global system.

Local Action:

- Manage existing forests and forestry
- Protect boglands and river edges.
- Connect natural corridors with wild planting
- Stop relying on herbicides and pesticides
- Support farmers who grow regeneratively.



Global Significance:

- Core value of the UN charter since 1945 (post WWII)
- address the global drivers of conflict, violence and injustice
- Aim to create a world for dignity and accountable governance.

- Cultivate a transparent structure in community groups
- Hold local government and law enforcement accountable.
- Build a supportive network of individuals and community groups.



- The 2030 Agenda is ambitious and require collective action by by local and global communities.
- We need to build mutual respect, trust and accountability.


Local Action:
